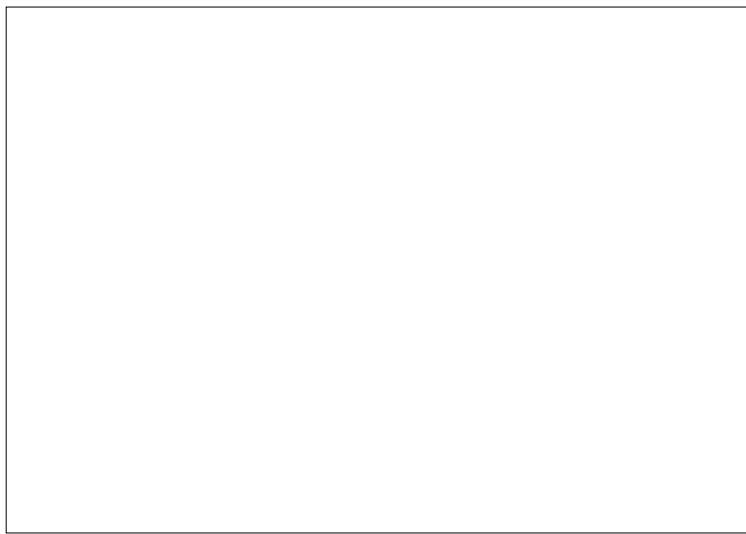

## From the President

This September we started our 5th year as an alumni association. There are about 30,000 alums who we know about and approximately 1,800 active (dues-paying) members.

Just think if all 30,000 became active members joined the association at \$25 a year. That would bring in \$750,000, which if invested at a minimum 5-percent would earn \$37,500 a year. With that income we could send two students a year to college at \$1,000 a year for four years (that's \$8,000 in total annual payments once the program

was fully phased in)—leaving \$29,500 a year to cover normal alumni association expenses.

I suggest to all class reunion leaders that you include in your planning a fund-raising event for the Alumni Association. The funds you contribute could be dedicated to support alumni scholarships. I can't think of a better gift to our alma mater.

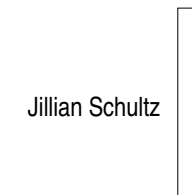

# News About ETHS

## ETHS opens with new expectations, programs

Close to 3,000 students—the largest enrollment in a decade—began classes at ETHS on August 30 with a renewed emphasis on academic achievement. The official enrollment of 2,967 includes the largest freshmen class in years (841). Enrollment projections show the student body peaking at 3,318 in 2005-2006, and remaining above 3,000 for the foreseeable future.

The racial make-up of this year's student population is 48.3% White, 40.2% Black, 2.8% Asian, 7.2% Hispanic, and 1.5% Multiracial.

After a four-year phase-in, ETHS last year required students to earn a minimum 2.0 grade-point average—a straight C average—to participate in extracurricular activities, including sports. This year the school raised the stakes by stating it will convert any “no credit” grade caused by lack of attendance to an F, which will then be factored into the student's GPA for eligibility.

The Illinois High School Association only requires students to be passing four classes, which could be with Ds, to compete in sports and other IHSA-sanctioned activities (forensics and chess, for example). At ETHS, an Academic Advisor monitors students' academic progress and provides tutoring assistance to students who fall below the minimum during their activity's season.

As in most American schools, safety is a concern after the tragedy in Littleton, CO, last spring. While ETHS had many safety measures in place or planned before Littleton, including a new video-camera security system and telephones in all classrooms, the ETHS administration has developed a comprehensive plan to cover a variety

of crises. New “code” warnings will warn the school population of danger—e.g., “Code Red,” which would divert students and staff behind locked classroom and office doors in the event of a dangerous intruder, for example, and “Code White,” which will keep students and staff in the school if a dangerous situation occurs in the community.

Freshmen began using personalized portfolios to record data such as grades and standardized test scores and their thoughts about the courses they take as they develop their own four-year plan leading to college or to work after graduation. As they work with their portfolios from year to year, the hope is they will base their path through ETHS on solid academic goals which they set for themselves.

Teachers at ETHS and in District 65, particularly those who teach English and math, will begin to use the locally developed learning standards for students in kindergarten through 12th grade. Teachers will use or develop new classroom-based assessments to measure if students are meeting the standards and to develop a collection of exemplary work.

This year ETHS will also implement its newly adopted program of standardized tests developed by American College Testing to measure student achievement over time.

The process begins in eighth grade when students take the Explore test, which surveys academic achievement and career interests; this was first given last year. Sophomores take the PLAN test, which also measures academic achievement and career interests. This year all juniors will take the ETHS ACT, a recently retired version of the ACT college-entrance exam. Students will be able to use this as a practice run for the real ACT, and the school will be able to compare the scores to their previous results on the PLAN, and eventually the Explore, to measure their progress.

ETHS is offering two new courses this year. Students interested in botany or a career in greenhouse management may take the new horticulture course, which will teach plant biology and propagation, greenhouse and nursery management, floriculture, pest management, and arboriculture. Seniors interested in sociology may take Sociology of Class, Gender and Race, which focuses on sociological theories and research methods and use them to develop solutions to social problems faced in Evanston and elsewhere.

### Other awards announced this fall

Three ETHS seniors—Donovan Burba, Leah Christie and Lucia Smith—have been named Achievement Award Winners in Writing by the National Council of Teachers of English. This honor places them among the best high school writers in America.

An ETHS senior, David Geisler, was named a Regional Finalist in the brand new science and technology competition sponsored by the Siemens Westinghouse. He will now compete at the regional level for a \$20,000 scholarship

and, if successful, will compete at the national level for a \$100,000 scholarship. This competition is different than the Intel Science Talent Search (formerly sponsored by Westinghouse Corp.). In that competition, last year ETHS had one of four Illinois semifinalists. Over the 58 years of this contest, ETHS has had enough Finalists to rank among the Top 10 schools in the nation.

ETHS Superintendent Allan Alson was honored at the State Superintendents Conference in September with a “Breaking the Mold” award for starting the Minority Student

Achievement Network, a national network of 15 multiracial suburban districts, including District 65, which are collectively seeking ways to eliminate the academic achievement gap between white and minority students. The Network was launched last February, held its first national conference in June, and has received a major grant from the

### Students earn perfect ACT scores

### Six ETHS National Achievement Semifinalists

Six ETHS seniors are among 1,500 Semifinalists in the National Achievement Scholarship Program, an academic competition for African American high school students sponsored by the National Merit Corporation. The students—(left to rt.) Kimberly Jackson, Shanti Hubbard, Ryan Nelson, Akilah Rogers, and (not pictured) Alyssa Van Dyk and Daniel Van Dyk—may continue in the competition for over 700 Achievement Scholarship awards.

Joyce Foundation to plan the research that will be conducted in the Network districts. Alson was among five Illinois superintendents to be recognized for their efforts to make positive changes in education.

For the sixth consecutive year, both District 65 and ETHS are among 82 Illinois school districts (out of a total of 898) to receive a 1999 Bright Red Apple Award from School Search, a Kansas City-based relocation firm. The award is based on five factors: academic performance, pupil/teacher ratio, expenditure per pupil, educational level of teachers, and average teacher salary.

Eighty-four students at ETHS, including nine current seniors, have been named AP Scholars by the College Board in recognition of their exceptional achievement on the college-level AP Exams. Approximately 23% of America's graduating seniors have taken one or more AP Exams. Only about 13% of the more than 700,000 students who took AP Exams in May 1999 performed at a sufficiently high level to merit such recognition. One student, Renee Saenger, Class of '99

valedictorian, qualified for the National Scholar Award by earning an average grade of 4 or higher eight or more exams.

In October, the St. Mark's School of Dallas, TX, hosted a special invitational tournament for the 15 best sophomore debate teams in the nation. The ETHS team of Nikki Braziel and Dan Deacon was the overall winner. Nikki also placed second in the individual speaker competition. ETHS and Glenbrook South High School were the only schools from Illinois that were invited to compete.

### New agreement with Illinois State U

Illinois State U has agreed to grant ETHS students proficiency credit if they earn an A or B in 3 Culinary Arts or Child Study and Child Psychology, three popular courses at ETHS. While proficiency agreements are not uncommon between high schools and community colleges, this agreement with Illinois State is only the second curriculum agreement of its kind that the university has entered into with an Illinois high school.

## QUEST students mentor younger minority peers

Approximately 30 high-achieving African American students at ETHS have taken on a challenge which could help change the lives of students of color who attend the Evanston/Skokie schools.

These students, sophomores to seniors, formed QUEST (Questioning, Understanding, Educating Students Together), a support program to help prepare middle- to high-achieving Evanston eighth-grade black students for the rigors and expectations of high school. By mentoring eighth graders, QUESTers hope to increase ETHS's minority enrollment in honors and advanced placement (AP) classes, to improve the students' overall achievement, and to buck the national trend that shows a disparity in academic achievement between minority students and their white counterparts.

The problem of the achievement gap is complex. However, QUEST presidents Shanti Hubbard and Maya Evans "feel that we can make a difference through our example and experience as high-achieving minority students," they recently said. And their message is profoundly simple:

We did it, so can you.

With the help of District 65 middle schools, QUEST students met with eighth graders in September to explain the program, and 70 students signed up. Five eighth graders are paired with two QUEST mentors, a configuration that is rescrumbled every quarter to allow the middle schoolers to meet as many QUESTers as possible to establish a strong peer group before they enter ETHS.

The commitment is ambitious. QUESTers meet together two to three Saturdays a month during the school year. Different monthly themes such as addressing underachievement, course selection, extra-curricular involvement, test-taking and college/ career counseling will be explored, some with guest speakers. Field trips to the theatre, symphony, or a museum, for example, will provide enriched educational exposure, opportunities which aren't always part of the black family experience, according to QUEST organizers. A visit to the University of Illinois in Champaign is slated for May.

Parents of participating QUEST eighth-graders are also encouraged to get involved, especially by pushing ETHS to

recognize the high academic potential of their children and demand their placement in rigorous, challenging courses.

Evans, a senior, is determined to help the younger generation of African Americans by reversing some causes she feels fuel the achievement gap: negative peer pressure, ill-advised school counseling, and a lack of self-advocacy. She also hopes that QUEST's aggressive mentoring will help fill in for working parents who cannot always be around to encourage and advocate for their children.

Following the QUEST model, a group of high-achieving Latino students at ETHS are organizing a similar program to encourage and mentor Latino eighth and ninth-graders who have the potential to do honors-level and Advanced Placement work. Latino QUEST students also plan to work with sophomore through senior peers through tutoring and helping them with ACT and SAT preparation and with college applications. A specific goal is to get as many Latino upper-classmen on the Honor Roll to enhance these students' opportunities for college.

nities for Women. Zimmer and Strahlman live in Evanston.

## Library benefits from overdue returns from alumni

Virginia Ayers, Head ETHS Librarian, received two unexpected gifts this fall.

One alum, who claimed anonymity, returned two books—after a 20-year hiatus: *Dearest Mama: Letters between Queen Victoria and the Crown Princess of Prussia, 1861-1864* and *Queen Victoria's Daughter*.

The donor said she (or he) was "mortified" and added: "I recall thinking that I was the only student interested in Queen Victoria, so I took at least one of these books home without checking it out. I can't recall doing this twice, but I must have. Please excuse the thievery. I grew up to love books, history, art and libraries. I realize that if we all helped

ourselves to our favorite books, then libraries would be in trouble. I sincerely apologize for my error."

The books were returned to Ayers along with a related one, *Dearest Child: Letters between Queen Victoria and the Princess Royal, 1858-1861*. S/He also included a "modest gift to the library for you to purchase something new."

Chicago resident Sally Kitt Chappell sent Ayers a punch card, used long ago by the ETHS library to identify books—this one or *Don Quixote*—and a \$100 donation. Ayers replied she will use the donation "to buy new titles for the library, perhaps one in Spanish to replace the long-lost *Don Quixote*."

## High seas adventure for ETHS alum/teacher

David Futransky, '69, who is currently a History/Social Science teacher at ETHS, participated in an educational adventure last spring. While teaching in a Chicago public school, he was invited to join Captain Bill Pinkney on the "Middle Passage Voyage." Pinkney, the first African American to circumnavigate the globe solo in a sailboat, was taking teachers on legs of a voyage that retraced the slave-trading routes. With planned stops in the Caribbean, South America and Africa, Pinkney, his crew, and teachers from around the country produced videotapes and lessons and interacted with over 400 schools from around the world via the Internet.

Futransky arrived in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, last February and was able to tour that city, immerse himself in Brazilian culture, and visit schools. He then flew to Salvador de Bahia where he met the *Sortilege* (the boat) and Pinkney after a long sail against currents from Puerto Rico. The boat needed repairs, so the crew of teachers explored the colonial capital of Portuguese Brazil, which was also the center of the slave trade for hundreds of years.

With a guide, they were able to video historic and cultural sights. These tapes are being used in classrooms by several thousand students and are bringing history to life with the writing, math, and science lessons that accompany them.

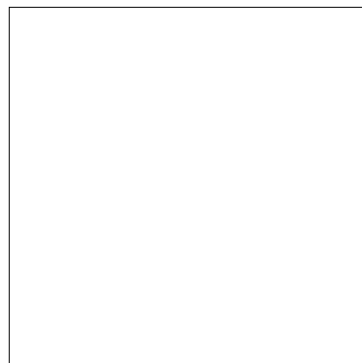

Captain Pinkney joined Futransky on November 19 for a presentation on their adventures together.

Captain Pinkney's visit on November 19 is made possible through the ETHS Dialogue Series. The Dialogue Series was started by the 50th reunion committees of the Classes of '45 and '47 to bring speakers to ETHS with specific expertise, job talents, historical interpretations, life experiences or cultural insights in to talk with student groups. Conversation, not lecture, would be the format with student participation through dialogue, question and answer. Approximately \$12,000 is currently available.

The Dialogue Series brought another speaker, René Sota, Founder of the Latino Research & Cultural Center, to ETHS this fall. Sota, a native-born Mexican, spoke with Latin American Studies classes about the survival of indigenous peoples of Mexico focusing on the conflicts in the state of Chiapas.

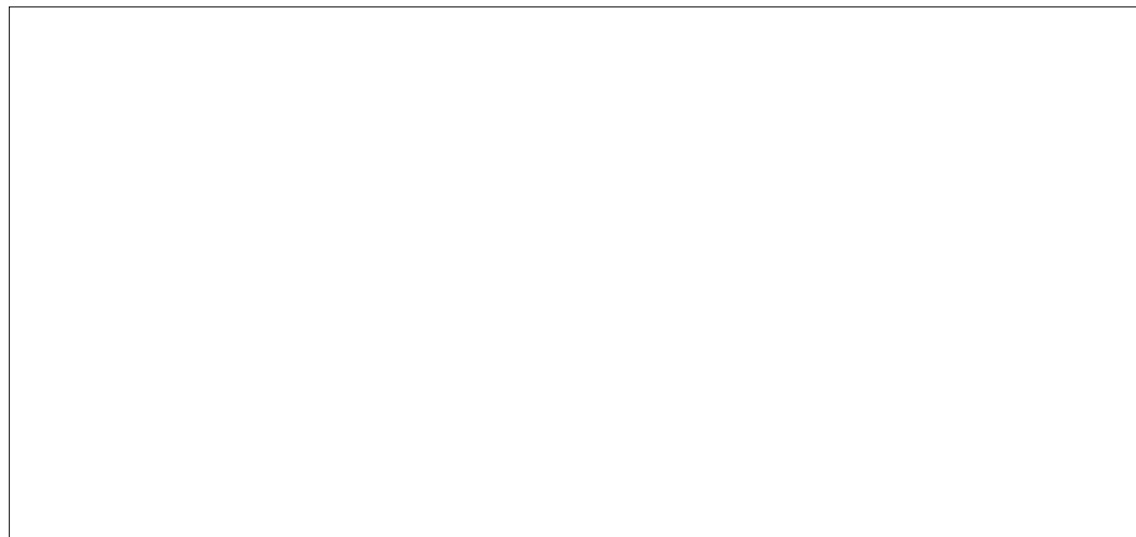

## Alumni "adopt" seniors going to college

Last summer 11 college-bound June graduates were offered a helping hand from ETHS alumni who live in their new college town. Through the alumni association's Adopt-a-Student Program, ETHS alums are linked up with a graduating senior who is attending a college in their area. By acting as a "home away from home," alums have the chance to share their Evanston Pride with a new graduate and sustain a meaningful connection to ETHS.

The program is the brain child of Corrie (Cockrell) Wallace, '90, a Spanish teacher at ETHS currently on leave. This year Ardis (Dechman) Coninx, '41, did the matching and follow-up with the students and participating alums.

While 56 alumni in 26 states and in Canada currently participate in the program, over 75% of ETHS's seniors annu-

ally scatter to colleges and universities in every state in the nation. Last year close to 100 of the Class of '99 asked to be adopted, but only 11 were able to be linked with one of the alumni adopters.

Sometimes the match-ups are a success, sometimes not. Tajalli Greengus, '94, who lives in Skokie, IL, adopted Inbal Fraiman, '99, who was accepted at Northwestern. "I took her out to breakfast recently at Walker Bros.," said Greengus, adding: "It was great meeting her! We talked about our experiences at ETHS and the entire college experience. I am looking forward to continue to keep in touch with her as a mentor."

On the other hand, Sherri (Igoe) Dembrowski, '64, who lives in Arvado, CO, and Harry Hampton, '41, of Branford, CT, either got a cool reception or no answer at all when they contacted their adopted

student. Both alums said they'd keep trying, however. "The program is a great idea," said Dembrowski. "Wish I had a recipe for success," she added.

Participating in the Adopt-a-Student Program is easy. Alums who want to sign up should check the box on the "ETHS Class Notes" form (found on page 11 in this newsletter), fill out their name and address, list the colleges that are near to them, and send the form to the ETHS Public/Alumni Relations Office.

When seniors tell the ETHS in the spring where they plan to go to college, the association will match them up with an alum who lives near that school. All alums need to do is make the initial contact and offer to be a resource for the student. (Consider offering a home-cooked meal. It would be a welcomed relief from dorm fare.)

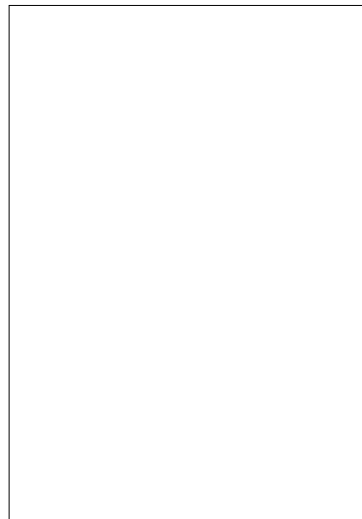
## 1936

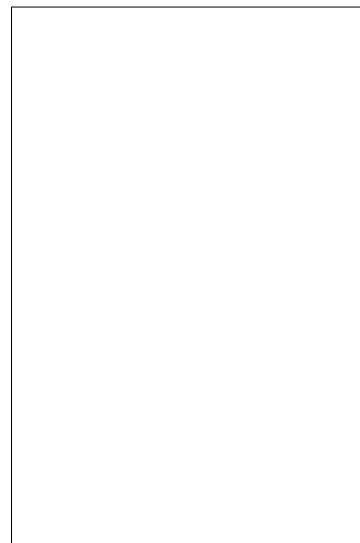

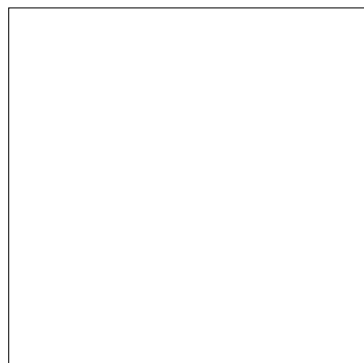
**Dr. John Amory Colwell** received the highest academic honor bestowed on specialists in internal medicine, a

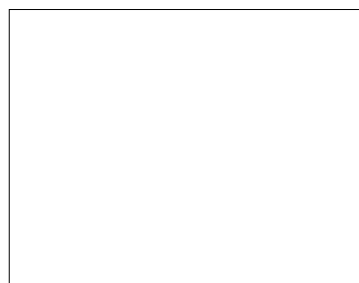

## Authors' Bookshelf collection tops 400

The ETHS Authors' bookshelf has received two additions which prove the versatility of our alumni. Nelson Culver, '29, also a retired teacher at ETHS, has contributed his first novel *Karisma*, reminiscent of relationships in his classes. David Burge '47, one of our internationally known musicians, has also turned to fiction, writing *Vanishing Spring* drawing on his experiences in the Far East.

Four authors who graduated in the '60s have also added to the collection. Charles Johnson, '66, has written *Dreamer*, a novel based on the last few months of the life of Martin Luther King, Jr. Alex Hancock, '69, contributed *Into the Light*, and Stephen Ellmann, '68, wrote *In a time of Trouble - Law and Liberty in South Africa's State of Emergency*. Jill Stern Sheeley, '68, has become a popular children's author with her *Adventures of Fraser the Yellow Dog*, some of which are already out-of-print. We have a hardcover copy of Fraser's *Rescue on Snowmass Mountain* and an audiotape of his adventures. For adults, she has compiled *Lighter Tastes of Aspen*, *Recipes from Aspen* and *Snowmass's Finer Restaurants*. Be warned—the recipes are for high altitudes!

Several alumni have written of problems in foreign

countries. Steven Heydemann, '75, has contributed his new book *Authoritarianism in Syria*. Rossall Johnson, '36, combined a career at N.U. Kellogg graduate school of business with assignments in exotic southeast Asia. *Executive decisions*, *Business Environment in An Emerging Nation*, and *Personnel and Industrial Relations* are now on the 'Shelf. Selected *Indonesian Vocabulary for the Foreign Executive*, which he wrote with his wife Helen, should be especially useful in the last months of 1999!

Also timely is Bernie Schoenburg's '72, *Illinois For Sale: Do Campaign Contributions Buy Influence?* He is a reporter based in Springfield, so his analysis should interest those of us who still live in our home state although the problem is probably world-wide.
