

Forest? Arboretum? The signs tell it all

Last fall, to mark its centennial year, the Garden Club of Evanston published a guidebook to the large and diverse collection of trees and shrubs located on Evanston High School's campus. Entitled *Arboretum: A Collection of Trees and Woody Shrubs,* the book is a photographic journal of the many plantings on the school grounds.

According to Victoria Wagner, Arboretum Committee Chairman, over the seven years it took to inventory, research, photograph, and add to the collection, all the trees and woody shrubs now have botanical signs with descriptive information for educational and display purposes.

"We were careful to make this appealing to students," said Wagner, "so the signage is fairly literal and easy to understand." And it's the educational signs that make this a true arboretum, not its size or variety of plantings. The ETHS Arboretum is possibly one of only four school-based arboreta in the country.

The project began in

2008 when the club approached the ETHS administration with its idea. Superintendent Eric Witherspoon, ETHS Foundation Director Fran Caan, and Chief Financial Officer William Stafford

were immediately supportive. The Foundation awarded \$25,000 to start the project, the club itself earmarked \$15,000, and Stafford said ETHS would underwrite the rest, including the signage.

> The club spent two to three years studying what is there, what should be added, and what needed replacing. Wanting to involve students in the process, the club sponsored a field trip to the Morton Arboretum in Lisle, IL. The educational experience there changed the project's focus. According to committee member Kathy Hardgrove, "What started as a tree project moved on to an arboretum."

educational materials, "and many are already planning curriculum around this," said Wagner.

The Garden Club of

Evanston has a long history with ETHS. When the 1921 bond issue passed to relocate ETHS to Church St. and Dodge Ave., the club gave ETHS 90 elm trees to celebrate its new home. In the early 2000s, the club helped ETHS turn two vacant acres behind the football stadium into a multi-habitat Nature Center for hands-on scientific study by students. All of these civic projects, including the arboretum, "foster greater respect and pride for the institution among the kids and the community," said Hardgrove.

This year, *The Washington Post* jumped ETHS's state rank from 17th to 10th, above neighboring North Shore schools, and upping its national rank from #585 to #287, out of nearly 22,000 U.S. public and private high schools, placing it in the top one-percent in the country. 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Superintendent's Letter

We are Wildkits. We are Family.

This spring we suffered a great loss at ETHS. We are heartbroken. And we are grieving.

Ross Freeland, who came to ETHS as a substitute

teacher in 2001, completed his student teaching here in 2003, taught mathematics, and coached baseball for 13 years, died March 14 after a brief battle with cancer. He was 41-years-old. We have posted stories online about

Ross that contain a great deal more information about his remarkable life and the impact he had on so many people. We miss him very much.

But, what I want to share with you today is how much this ordeal has affirmed for me what a special place this really is. Upon learning about the diagnosis, friends and colleagues started a Go Fund Me page. We knew that the prognosis was not good and Ross was hoping to try some experimental cancer treatments. Within one

month, the fund grew to over \$80,000 to support Ross and his family. Nearly 900 people contributed.

While Ross was beloved by people who knew him from his years of leading Camp Highland for Boys and in other important ways, the outpouring and generosity from ETHS was profound.

Current and former students and baseball players contributed mightily to the fund. Their families contributed. Current and former ETHS colleagues contributed. ETHS alumni from all over the world communicated on social media.

On the day of the visitation services, the line stretched for hours. All the current baseball players, wearing shirts and ties, came to honor Coach Freeland. I stood in line with an alumnus baseball player and his parents who made the extra effort to be there. Many of his current and former students attended. His colleagues attended and they were devastated. ETHS came together filled with love and emotion.

As I have experienced and reflected on this sad loss, I have recognized several things. First, an untimely

death is unbearably hard to understand and deal with. Ross was so young. Second, Ross was an exceptional man and that accounted for this outpouring of concern and sadness. But, this sad time has also reaffirmed something important about this amazing school and community. ETHS is a family. There is a special bond we all have, a shared ETHS experience that we know is unparalleled and special that transcends generations. We are the Orange and Blue.

We can all take deep pride in having experienced and shared this amazing school—deep satisfaction from being part of the Wildkit family.

What's New at ETHS?

21st-century manufacturing lab opens at ETHS

Last fall ETHS held its third ribbon-cutting ceremony, the first two heralding the refurbished Lake Street Tennis Courts and the Planetarium. This time ETHS unveiled its newly renovated Advanced Manufacturing Lab at a public event that drew the Mayor of Evanston, school board members, industry leaders, Northwestern University STEM leaders, donors, ETHS administrators and teachers, parents, and the students who will use the lab.

The high-tech facility will allow students in manufacturing and Industrial Tech courses to gain hands-on experience that will help them enter the workforce with the background and skills they need for careers in high-growth industries.

Courses held in the lab include Metal Sculpture, Manufacturing Technology, and Manufacturing Engineering/Computer Integrated Manufacturing (CIM), where students are introduced to and gain valuable skills for careers in welding, technical machining, and engineering. Students enrolled in the CIM course can earn industryrecognized machining certification from the National Institute of Metalworking

Skills in the areas of measurement, materials, and

safety—credentials that will help prepare them for degreed technical programs and in-demand careers after high school. It is also one of several national Project Lead The Way

certified pre-engineering courses that ETHS offers.

According to Andria Cheng, a reporter for Mar*ketWatch*, manufacturing jobs are returning to the U.S. at a record level, due in part to escalating wages in traditionally lower-cost countries, including China. In addition, with advancements in technology such as robotics, says Dwight Hotchkiss of Colliers' International, more companies are realizing that they don't have to go offshore to find skilled employees.

Upgraded facilities in the Advanced Manufacturing Lab include new welders, a mill and router, a computer numerical controlled lathe, new air-filtration system, modern welding booths, drill presses, and 3-D printers, among other equipment—a well-designed lab that reflects a 21st-century industry environment. The ETHS Educational Foundation spearheaded funding for the lab's renovation. More than \$450,000 came from ETHS parents and alumni, foundations and corporations, including ITW/Miller Electric Manufacturing Co., the Cless Family Foundation, and the Winifred Guthrie Anderson Fund.

One recent source of alumni funding to support Career and Technical Education (CTE) initiatives comes from **Sydney Pond, '53**, who donated \$100,000 this past fall to establish an endowed Vocational Education Fund to enrich the educational experience of students enrolled in CTE courses and certification programs, including Manufacturing/ CIM taught in the new lab.

IN GENERAL

In February, ETHS District 202 received a Aaa rating from Moody's Investor Services, placing it among a select group of 68 school districts nationwide to receive this high-quality rating. Ratings are issued each time the District issues bonds, and the 2016 rating marks the third consecutive time in eight years ETHS has earned this rating. ETHS is the only public entity in Evanston to currently have a Aaa Moody's rating.

ETHS placed first in the under 5,000-enrollment category in the 22nd annual Magna Awards program sponsored by the National School Board Assn.'s journal. The ETHS "teamASAP" (team Access & Success in Advanced Placement) program won in this national recognition program that honors school board best practices and innovative programs that advance student learning. This is the only first-place Magna Award ever given to an Illinois school district in the 20+ years the prize has been awarded.

Four ETHS seniors— Matteo Di Bernardo, Murielle Dunand, Nora Linzer, and Seth Pater**nostro**—are among the semifinalists for the 2016 Presidential Scholars Program, one of the nation's highest honors for high school graduating seniors. Application is by invitation only, and the White House Commission on Presidential Scholars reviews the applications of all semifinalists in April. Up to 161 scholars are chosen on the basis of their accomplishments in many areas - academic and artistic success, leadership, and involvement in school and the community.

Six ETHS students were chosen to participate in The Illinois High School Art Exhibition in March. The exhibition featured work from more than 100 Illinois high schools. ETHS students included seniors Cardenas, Ben Good (graphic design), **Carly** Korleski (painting) and Rena Newman (drawing); junior Ziana Pearson-Muller (photography); and sophomore Seth Steinberg (Time Arts).

In February, 10 ETHS seniors were named Finalists (out of 11 semifinalists) in the National Merit Scholarship Program. Finalists will be considered for scholarships offered in spring 2016 based on their abilities, skills, and accomplishments. English, math, and physics, each working in two subject areas.

In January, 16 ETHS teams competed in the 18th annual international COMAP High School Mathematical Contest in Modeling, where students work on complex problems to develop a solution using knowledge from math, science, and computer science classes. Out of more than 700 papers submitted, one ETHS team of juniors were National Finalists (among the top 3%), three teams of seniors were in the top 10%, and one senior and two junior teams were in the top third.

ETHS senior **Zane Kashner** was named a semifinalist in the prestigious Intel Science Talent Search 2016, placing him among the top 300 science research students (out of 1,750 entrants) in the US, and one of only five from Illinois. Each semifinalist earns a \$1,000 award from the Intel Foundation with an additional \$1,000 going to his or her school for science research. Kashner is the 13th semifinalist from ETHS since 2000.

The Illinois Student Assistance Commission named 192 ETHS seniors as 2016-17 Illinois State Scholars, placing them among the top 10% of seniors from across the state.

Three ETHS students were chosen to participate in the 2016 Illinois Music Education Assn. All-State Conference in January. Senior **Seth Bearman** placed second in composition; junior **Momoko Hasselbring**, French hornist, performed in the All-State Orchestra; and senior **Maggie Bambic** was chosen to attend a Future Music Educators workshop.

Twenty-four ETHS students participated in a TEAMS engineering competition sponsored by the Technology Student Association with ETHS teams taking third, fourth and fifth place at the 2016 regional event.



Camille Allen was nominated by history teacher Corey Winchester and Mary Fifles Collins, '84, ETHS Community Service Coordinator.

In April, senior **Camille Allen** received the Techny BridgeBuilder Award that honors people in Chicago's northern suburbs who have brought diverse groups together to built bridges of hope and unity in their communities. Allen is the student rep on the ETHS school board and a member of the leadership board of ETHS SOAR (Students Organized Against Racism).

ETHS students and staff members raised more than \$3,000 for childhood cancer research on "St. Baldrick's Day" held Thursday, March 17. This year, 46 individuals participated in the event that is part of a national awareness event and fundraiser. Since 2010, ETHS students and staff have raised nearly \$20,000 for kids with cancer.

ETHS bumps up its branding, signage schedule

In 2014, ETHS kicked off a multi-phase branding and signage project. It initially focused on updating the ETHS brand. Following a survey of the school community, two notable identifiers—the ETHS crest and Willie Wildkit mascot logo—were redesigned. With a nod to ETHS tradition, the crest now features the familiar school front with its iconic towers, and Willie has been refreshed.

The second phase will improve overall signage to help students, staff, and visitors better navigate the 1.2 million square-foot school building and 65acre campus.

ETHS students traverse more than three miles of hallways throughout the school year. Over time, due to building expansion and classroom re-use, internal signage has fallen victim to inconsistent terminology, different presentations, and confusing room numbering, often causing staff to resort to paper signs taped to the walls.



ETHS will keep the current color-coding system (and reduce the Arts Wing to one color), but will return to the North, South, East, West designations for the wings.

The wings' existing colorcoding will be enhanced (North/red, South/green, East/blue, and West/orange).

The first floor's central "H-Hall" corridor will become "Heritage Hall" where ETHS can showcase its history and progress with visitors to the school. Rooms will be renumbered, looking to correct numbers that are out-ofsequence or missing. **The ETHS** school board hired Evanston-based Glantz Design and Allegra print and sign company to partner with ETHS on these projects. While the internal signage schedule was accelerated to be done by freshman orientation in August, external signage Smart phones and tablets that give users top ETHS news stories, calendar info, links to the alumni association and foundation web pages, staff directory, instant alerts, and links to ETHS's other social media outlets.

Last spring, ETHS also revamped its web site (www. eths.k12.il.us) to make it more accessible and useful to the school, community, prospective families, and visitors.

In addition, the back driveway will be dubbed "Wildkit Drive." updates are next on the list including outside entrances, athletic fields, and parking lots.

Funds for the entire signage project come from ETHS's Capital Improvements Fund, which must be used for improvements to school facilities and infrastructure.
